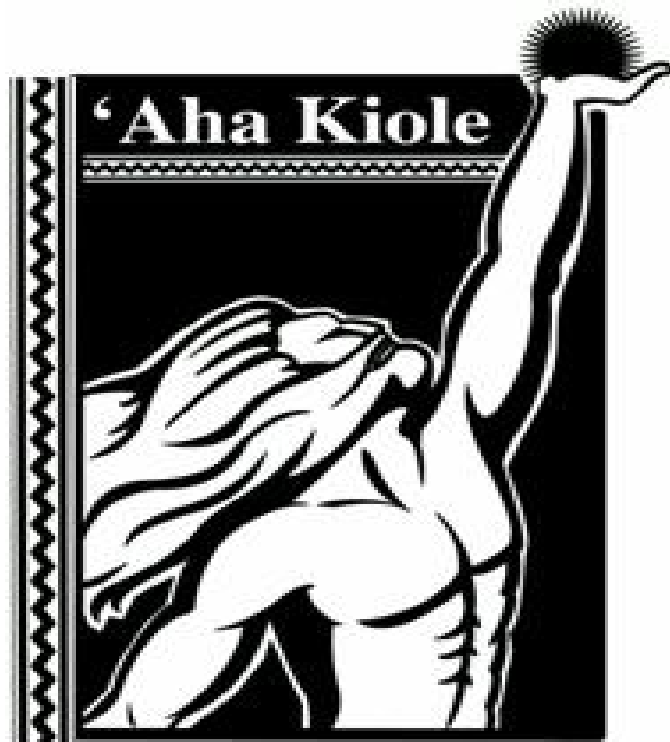

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Introduction

The work of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee (AKAC) was fast-paced, intense and often chaotic. The 2007 legislature passed SB1853 SD2 HD2 and it became law as Act 212 in June of 2007. The law called for the creation of an Aha Kiole committee to initiate a process to create a system of best practices based on traditional natural resource management in Hawaii – the Aha Moku system. Committee members were selected on October 30, 2007 and accepted their appointment on November 1, 2007. The legislature required a report to be filed with the 2009 Legislature. This gave the committee 14 months to determine the “best practices” for traditional management and write the report for the legislature. The Act appropriated funds for this work but the funds were not available for various reasons and the entire initiative was funded largely out of personal funds of the AKAC members. AKAC members took their appointments seriously and devoted much of their personal time to this effort. What is presented here is a timeline of the combined Aha Kiole/Aha Moku activities from November 1, 2007 to December 31, 2009.

The Committee members are not scientists, professionals or attorneys. They are traditional practitioners and citizens who lead their lives practicing their cultural traditions and enjoying their families. They applied themselves to the task, meeting and talking with members of their communities, meeting and discussing with themselves to inform the report to the legislature. For many of the AKAC members this activity was beyond their experience and made for a disorganized, haphazard and anxiety-filled experience. They persevered and, at the end, with few writing skills and few computer skills they called upon friends and family to assist with the report and complete the task. The AKAC hopes that the report will be read, appropriate laws enacted, the activities outlined in the report achieved and, most important of all, elements of the Aha Moku system are established so that the environment of Hawaii is restored and managed sustainably for today, tomorrow and the future.

The timeline begins on the last day of Puwalu V. Puwalu V is the last of the series of conferences held between August 15, 2006 and November 1, 2007. The purpose of the series was to advance the quest for long-term protection and restoration of land and sea in Hawaii, and advocacy of Hawaiian culture and traditional practices throughout Hawai‘i. The timeline is followed by selected documents, in chronological order, generated by this initiative that demonstrates the frantic, frenetic and, at times, highly emotional activity over the 14 months to achieve the requirements set by the Legislature.

'Aha Moku council moves forward with newly announced advisory committee

More than 100 Native Hawaiian experts and kūpuna (elders) versed in Native Hawaiian traditional fishing and farming practices gathered Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 in Honolulu to discuss the nuts and bolts of creating a modern day 'Aha Moku Council System.

Based on pre-contact natural resource governance in Hawai'i, the 'Aha Moku system recognizes the traditional geo-political division of each island into ahupua'a (akin to the present-day concept of watershed areas) and moku (a political district of two or more adjacent ahupua'a).

The 24th Hawai'i Legislature endorsed the 'Aha Moku Council System with passage of Act 212, which Gov. Linda Lingle signed into law on June 27, 2007. The Act, among other things, creates an eight-member advisory committee to facilitate creation of the 'Aha Moku Council System. Under the Act, the various moku on each island will select an 'Aha Kiolo, and the eight 'Aha Kiolo will form an 'Aha Moku Council Commission, which will oversee the 'Aha Moku Council System and be its liaison to the legislature.

The eight members selected for the 'Aha Moku advisory committee are:

Vanda Wahinekuipua Hanakahi, Moloka'i, chair of the committee, a community cultural specialist. In her childhood home, Hawaiian was the spoken language and Hawaiian cultural practices were a way of life.

Timmy Paulokaleioku Bailey, Maui, a biological science technician at Haleakalā National Park. He is recognized as an authority on the relationship between Native Hawaiian natural resources and culture.

Winifred "Winnie" Mano Basques, Lāna'i, is retired from Lāna'i Community Hospital and serves on the County of Maui's Council of Aging. She learned the lawai'a and mahi'ai practices and knowledge of her ancestors from her kūpuna.

Jean Ilei Beniamina, Kaua'i, an assistant professor in student services, Kaua'i Community College. She is an award-winning singer/songwriter, leading organizer and community liaison for Hawai'i education and one of the founders of 'Aha Punana Leo, being named the Native Hawaiian Education Association's 2007 Educator of the Year.

Charles William Kanaha Kapua, O'ahu, is retired from the Honolulu Police Department and the U.S. Army Reserve. He was taught the ways of mahi'ai and lawai'a from his grandparents, Elizabeth and David Hoopi'i, who began teaching him from the age of 6.

Leslie Aipalena Kuloloio, Kaho'olawe, is a cultural expert who believes in a simple Hawaiian lifestyle, which includes fishing and planting using natural resources found within one's own moku boundaries. The island of Kaho'olawe is part of his ancestral and cultural connections through both of his parents' genealogies.

Hugh "Buttons" Lovell, Hawai'i, agricultural research specialist, Research Corporation of the University of Hawai'i, Kamuela, Hawai'i. He was raised by his mother and grandparents, John and Precious Puniwai in Pu'ue'o, island of Hawai'i (Moku 'O Keawe), from whom he learned traditional planting, gathering and fishing practices.

Sharon Pomroy, Kaua'i, Lehua Mamo Flower Farm. One acre of her six-acre farm is dedicated to restoring the native forest that once grew there. She offers her

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Charles Bryant with Ululani Beirne as Facilitator/Recorder

Pule: The pule was offered by Ruben Pukahi

Ululani shared her role and that of our women that attend meetings and Conventions to educate ourselves and bring that information back to our communities-it is a supporting role to our communities and those men/kane not able to attend these meetings and Conventions.

New Law ACT 212

Also shared about the last legislation that was signed into law by Governor Linda Lingle....S.B.1853 now ACT 212 Relating to Native Hawaiians. Senator Mele Carrol authored this bill which will establish AHA MOKU COUNCILS throughout our Hawaiian Islands as in the generations passed, that native Hawaiians protected their environment and sustained the abundance of resources that they depended upon for thousands of years. This has to do with all those subjects discussed in the earlier kukakuka sessions for the last two meetings with this group.

Puwalu Sessions

Both Ululani and Auntie Gladys Pualoa-Ahuna shared about the Puwalu-series of meetings with many of our Hawaiian communities, where many are working and becoming revitalized using the knowledge of cultural practitioners passed down through kupuna, and experienced farmers (mahi'ai) and fishers (lawai'a) that practiced self-sufficiency, a subsistence lifestyle (living off our own resources) those native Hawaiians planted as taro (kalo), sweet potato (u'ala), banana (mai'a) breadfruit (ulu) and all the fish that was plentiful in our Ahupua'a. These are our native Hawaiians that can advise government agencies, other organizations and interested groups to use "TRADITIONAL" knowledge and Ahupua'a management practices. There were over 100 practitioners and representatives from 37 "MOKU" in the State of Hawai'i in attendance to bring about this legislation. Now its our turn to work in our respective Ahupua'a and Moku to put our mana'o on the table on our traditional rights, konohiki

rights, water rights, rights to the land to include gathering rights, and our rights to the ocean, to include gathering rights.

Organize/Educate

Cy Phillips felt it was time that the fishermen organize and get educated on these issues discussed in kukakuka session regarding changes in the laws and native Hawaiian rights versus those on the books. He would like to invite Senator Clayton Hee to the next meeting in two weeks.

Ululani will work with Department of Land & Natural Resources, State Parks staff t obtain booklets on Fishing Legislation for 2007. May Au has also been acquiring info booklets. Ululani has also requested any and all literature on “gathering rights.”
Reminder that OHA also has Apology Bill booklet available to our community and this newly organized group.

Concerns of Fishermen:

- 1) Jet Ski’s in the Ahupua’a O Kahana - Scare away all the akule, moi and mullet/all fish. We need to also have laws on “recreational ocean activities”.
Jet Ski’s should be outside the breakers/Reef is the feedback from group.
- 2) Netting is a big concern- the amount of nets allowed to catch fish
135 feet to 150 feet one piece /Lau -deprive fishermen of teaching children
- 3) Closing off areas that the native Hawaiians fish/Sanctuaries/kapu system
Fish spawning seasons
- 4) Other issues regarding squid and opihi were also discussed
- 5) Banning Night diving/pole fishing
- 6) Monk Seal incident - caught in the net/Issue of dead coral at Hanauma

AHUPUA’A REPRESENTATION:

The group decided who would represent their Ahupua’a and be the voice for their concerns in Moku O Ko’olauloa.....Each representative meet in Ahupua’a first, then on Moku level.

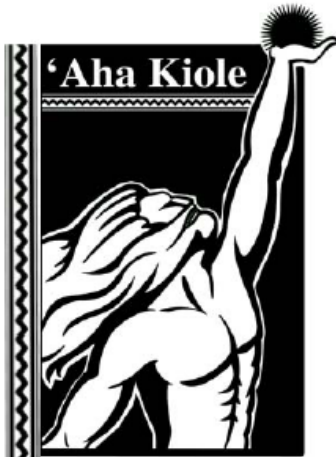

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Summary of Meeting

Dept. of Land & Natural Resources

November 7, 2007

A Meeting was held at the Dept. of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Office, Room 330 in the Kalanimoku Building on Punchbowl Street in Honolulu on Wednesday, November 7, 2007 from 10:30am to 12:00 noon.

Present at the meeting were: Dan Polhemus, Director, DLNR Division of Aquatics (DAR), Francis Oishi, DAR, Brian – Budget Officer for DAR, Vanda Hanakahi, Chair, Aha Kiolo Advisory Council (AKAC), Charles Kapua, Oahu Kiolo (AKAC), Leimana DaMate, staff (AKAC), Opuulani Albino, Molokai, and Toni Lee, Oahu.

Focus of the meeting was on the release of funds for the AKAC in accordance with Act 212. Mr. Oishi explained that the funds allocated by the Legislature for AKAC came under the heading of "non-program" budget items for DLNR. As such, DLNR needed to request the release of said funds from the state general funds.

The procurement process was discussed in detail as any expense that fell between \$15,000 and \$40,000 would be subject to the State Procurement Law. The usual timeframe for disbursement of funds would be four to six months. As the community work needed to be begun as soon as possible, DAR offered to expedite the process if all requested documents were submitted by Monday, November 12, 2007.

AKAC Chair, Ms. Hanakahi explained the importance of a timely release of funds as the mandated Legislative Report was due in one month, and the contractor needed to be hired to begin the community meetings work and the draft of the Legislative Report.

A revised budget and budget narrative was submitted to DLNR. Attendees perused the budget documents and discussion centered on items that still needed to be submitted. These items include: a current work plan and time frame in which the objectives would be met and a detailed description of the contractor position for community coordinator.

A request was made to DAR for office space for the Kiolo. Unfortunately, DAR has no space available, and recommended that the Division of Forestry and Wildlife (DOFAW) and the Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement (DOCARE) be contacted for help in this area. A letter will be sent to Laura Thielen, DLNR Director from AKAC to address this.

**Summary – Conference Call
Report and Discussion of meeting with DLNR
November 8, 2007, 1:00 pm – 2:00 pm**

A conference call was placed between the Aha Kiole Advisory Council on Wednesday, November 8, 2007 at 1:00 p.m. WPRFMC allowed the use of their conference call line to the AKAC.

Calling in from the neighbor islands were Kiole: Sharon Pomroy, Kauai; Winnie Basques, Lana'i; Ilei Beniamina, Niihau; Buttons Lovell, Hawaii.

On site were: Vanda Hanakahi, Chair, Molokai; Charles Kapua, Oahu, Leimana DaMate; Opuulani Albino, Molokai; and Toni Lee, Oahu.

A verbal report was given to the Aha Kiole on the results of the meeting with DLNR on the release of funds. Important areas of discussion were:

- The proposed community meetings draft agenda would be done and sent to all Kiole for editing and approval. It is important that all islands are on the same page so the agenda and format would be consistent. Agendas, sign-in sheets, and documentation of each meeting is important. All must be sent to Leimana who will compile and file them in preparation for the Legislative Report.
- The explanation of the criteria needed for each level of po'o would be drafted;
- The application process was discussed and Vanda Hanakahi agreed to draft the initial form. This will be sent to Leimana who would forward to all Kiole for editing and approval. Once approved, the final application form would be taken to all community meetings. It was recommended that the puwalu participants would screen eligible applicants.
- Discussion centered on the criteria for eligible applicants for the po'o positions. More dialogue is needed to come to resolution.
- A request was made for the list of all of the puwalu participants so that community meetings can begin. After discussion, it was agreed upon that the list would not be released, and the community meetings would be postponed until the agendas were approved, the criteria was set and the application process solidified.
- In any event, until the funding is released, no community meeting can be held.

The conference call concluded at 2:00 p.m.

Island reports:

Sharon: Re DLNR meetings – was not able to attend. Have not had any community meetings. Attended workshop on fishponds in Hanalei by Buddy Keala –will work on this project in Hanalei. 11-acre fishpond that is privately owned by Patsy Wilcox-Sheehan. Wants to keep it as culturally correct as possible. Sharon approached on issue regarding purchasing Menehune Fishpond – Alekoko on Huli'ia Stream. Owner consulted (out of 35 acres, 30 acres are fishponds). Issues being discussed currently. Contractual employees of Sheraton in Poipu taking sand to complete work on the hotel.

Winnie: 2 sessions on Lanai re: DLNR. 1st meeting with Russell Sugi. Issues revolving around fuel docks in Lana'i – fuel dock is illegal. Spoke about Aha Kiole. Per Mark, funds will be released in December or early January 2008.

Bill Huleloa, DAR – brought info on ACL, Annual Catch Limit for 2008. This revolves around the boats that need registration for fishing. Types of fish were identified to the community. Lana'i people are asking about the Aha Moku Systems, and the Aha Kiole

Les: Kahoolawe – spoke to Emmett Aluli, KIRK – going through reorganization of KIRK. Planning to use Aha Kiole to work with the Maui Aha Kiole in dealing with issues. Reason – Kahoolawe was once traditionally connected to Maui and Molokini. KIRK is already under the umbrella of DLNR. Is asking for status report to date for Kahoolawe – this will be the beginning of the data base for Kahoolawe. What is the cultural land use plan? What is the cultural protocol plans? How will these be used? Bridged? There are no people on Kahoolawe and thus can be used as a cultural model. Can use this model in the long-run. Mana'o today will be used for the January 2008 KIRK meeting. Need to be trained here first. Will ask for Les and Timmy be on the agenda. Possibility that Kahoolawe can be mapped with traditional ahupua'a. Will need to find out who staff is for KIRK, funding is diminishing for KIRK. Can transition into the Aha Kiole program. Perhaps they can learn from us. They have followed the western perspective and must go back to the Aha Kiole structure. Island resources must be captured and studied – their own uniqueness. (Vanda) Pua Kanahale worked very closely on the cultural plan. Will also continue to research, through Maui Aha Kiole meetings, to find existing families who have traditionally used and fished in Kahoolawe.

Issue: federal mandate of high technology identifying issues in harbors.

Timmy: Maui - Since puwalu and presentations, been approached by county to do presentation on land resources for county employees. Mayor asked for ocean awareness trainings in Lahaina and Kihei. The awareness is coming – make up of meeting: (Lahaina) mixture of Hawaiians and others, (Kihei) a mixture. Molokini was discussed – awareness is good. Royal Order of Kamehameha active. A letter officially sent out to all stating that we need to get rolling. (Mana – check email). Presented to the National Park - local in favor, transplants don't care yet. December – presented a kokua presentation to Royal Order – asked for participation in meeting with Royal Order. Presentation will be in January, to help with facilitation with meetings. Mele Carroll requested that Les and Timmy attend a water resource forum. Forum showed that Maui has no sustainability plan for water resources, need education – don't understand the balance behind the water issue. Worked on a first draft for a community ppt. for review. Ppt is based on contact level and not controversial issues. Organizational chart necessary for contact structure to get information flowing. Most of organizations in Maui on same page, but have not reached status now. Ed Lindsey spoke at the water forum – was not adequate, needs to be trained. Must be positive, not negative in approach.

Charlie: Oahu – after November, attended a meeting in Waianae – Neighborhood Board meeting for the shoreline fishermen who questioned DLNR on policies relating to shoreline shelter (camping). Final outcome: DLNR won. After meeting, met with fishermen to talk about Aha Moku structure – gave them copies of Act 212 and asked them to contact him when next meeting is called. Took Mana's advice, Kitty's advice to send mahalo letters to legislature thanking them for support. Received positive responses from Kokubun. Sent letter to Hawaiian Caucus, request that island legislators be sent response or Xmas cards to own legislature. Met with Clarence Nishihara, Senator for Pearl City – was very responsive to Aha Kiole. Will be asking for funds on behalf of the Kiole. Another group – Kahana Bay fishermen are in the process of organizing – invited Charlie to attend 12/4 meeting, but due to the storm – meeting may have been cancelled. Received call from Bill Akiona, Waianae – wants to plant trees along base of mountain from Makaha to Nanakuli – is having meeting on 12/19, 6pm, in Waianae Gym. Asked for explanation of Aha Kiole. Paaiau Fishpond issue – is looking into this issue (McGrew area). Question on where the pond is located – McGrew Point (Halawa area). Charlie addressing this issue – will do a site visit. Civic clubs were notified. He is a potential aha moku representative. Bill Akiona.

(Vanda- must preserve culture and look at sources. Must identify resources from that specific aina – focus on own ahupua'a. Halau and other organizations also play a very important part of these issues and meetings)

Article by Mele Carroll on Aha Kiole.

Vanda – Molokai – La'au was a big victory for the island. Because of the community backing, the DLNR rejected the EIS. The LUC began a motion to reject the EIS, but Molokai Ranch asked to withdraw the EIS. Now starting a new strategy – downsizing (people will lose jobs). Project now by Hawaiian group to buy back the Molokai Ranch – needs to be in the hands of the Aha Kiole. Communities support Aha Kiole. Still use

SCCA and other organizations to continue community outreach. In Sept. went to Kona with Wayde Lee. Met with program leaders dealing with culture – very interested in aha Kiole structure. Ulu Garmon attended, anxious to hear more about the Aha Kiole. Did a workshop on Oahu with Kaimikaua’s halau – community will be kept apprise more on Aha Kiole. Re: bottom fishing meeting/DLNR – only few attended bad weather. Came out in meetings that recommendations came from Kitty to only be able to catch 6 species with 5 bag-limit. Outside of the EEZ, there is no limit. DAR representative, Bill Puleloa. Data was questioned – based on reports. Must study DLNR rules that deal with fishing laws – federal, state, local, traditional jurisdictions.

- Vanda: Safeguard. To qualify to be a nominee, one must meet certain criteria. We have to be loyal to that and have puwalu be the ones to interview nominees. To be on the slate, you must meet certain criteria. We can set the criteria. An interview process must be put into place by the puwalu or by the kiole. Must define the role of the moku rep.

Molokai, Vanda Hanakahi

Kiolo Vanda Hanakahi reported that in Moloka'i, the subsistence lifestyle is followed. Younger age groups are meeting and resources that are in use are being identified. The community is being engaged in moku discussions with a workable timetable to be finalized.

Lanai, Winifred Basques

Kiolo Winifred Basques is working with revered kupuna Sol Kaopuiki as well as those from Lana'i who attended the Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu Series. The Laulima Group, newly formed is beginning to grow limu in Lana'i. It is recommended that Ilei Kanupai and Irene Cockett be contacted to be a part of the participant list for future Puwalu.

Kahoolawe (Island of Kaniloa), Leslie Kuloloio

Kiolo Leslie Kuloloio is beginning the Kiolo collaboration with the Kahoolawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC) through which he will explain and describe Act 212, short/long-range plan for land use and cultural history of Kahoolawe including the traditional chants stating that Maui was once an ahupua'a of Kahoolawe and Molokini. Kahoolawe will play a big part of the resource management of the surrounding waters of Maui County. All islands have a geographical connection.

Research is also being done on the traditional history of Kahoolawe focusing on the following:

- Did Kahoolawe ever have an ahupua'a system? If so, where is the ole, the chants, of kupuna who frequented the island before western contact?
- Must give the public a clear view of relationship between Maui and Kahoolawe
- Since KIRC has been in existence, will ask for copies of cultural programs and resource history that has transpired since occupation, mitigation, return of island, and state programs.
- KIRC also comes under DLNR. The Protect Kahoolawe 'Ohana (PKO) and its mandate will be studied.
- Practitioners who use Kahoolawe as a resource will be contacted

- OHA is a part of the management of the island; Aha Kiolo will connect those resources.
- Kiolo Winifred Basques was contacted by OHA to sit on the KIRC – she will work with Kiolo Kuloloio

Oahu, Charles Kapua

Kiolo Charles Kapua attended the following community meetings:

- Attended community meeting in Waianae hosted by Bill Akiona. Community issue is proposal to plant native trees along the base of Waianae.
- Water issues in Waianae continue to be a concern. Community states that water is now being stopped from coming over to Waianae
- Kiolo met with Hanalei Hoff on the Kukaniloko Heiau in Wahiawa. The Waianae Uka area is being affected. Tom Lenchenko has requested the Kiolo to help in this issue
- Biggest problem on Oahu is the boundary issue. There was no Waipahu in earlier years. Boundaries need to be further identified.
- Nanakuli is a separate ahupua'a
- Kona moku will be difficult to identify, but efforts are underway to identify traditional practitioner families in the Kona Moku.

Kauai, Moku O Kalanipo, Sharon Pomroy

Kiolo Sharon Pomroy has connected with various organizations and individuals through numerous social events where the Kiolo and Act 212 have been described. Included in these meetings are:

- Met with the West HI Watershed groups and the County Council, - there are a number of organizations that have impacts within their own communities where the aha moku can assist
- Attended the restoration workshop on the Fishpond in Hanalei.
- Sand is being stolen in Kauai from beaches
- South shore people are organized and want to become involved in Aha Moku structure. Ready to form their ahupua'a councils.
- Kauai is ready for action!

Niihau, Ilei Beniamina

Kiolo Ilei Beniamina was in Niihau from December 25-31, 2007 where she met with 'ohana on ovai, mahea and heaha. She is working on cataloguing the caretakers and families familiar with knowledge of specific sites as well as developing a list of practitioners in Niihau.

- Suggestion: create new ahupua'a based on population. We are not there to manage people, but to malama the resources. Instead of looking at the population, look at the resources, document and malama. People move – resources do not.
- Attended the Kauai Watershed meetings – came away with the ORMP structure.
- The names of the islands past Niihau (NWHI) is wrong and will be corrected.

At the end of the Mokupuni reports, it was noted that for the first round of community meetings to be done before July 2008, the Kiolo should focus on explaining Act 212 yet

use the Hawaiian concept of Ho'okama'aina – finding the people who are familiar with the resources now in their specific places.

Traditionally, the neighboring ahupua'a or moku of the unoccupied ones take care of the resources. Families with ties to the specific aina will come forward.

Members of the public offered oral testimony which included:

Charles Kanohowailuku: Suggested that a notice to gather all konohiki families for a conference be put in the Office of Hawaiian Affairs Ka Wai OHA newspaper.

Talbert David George Sr: Spoke on Hawaiian issues currently found in the Supreme Court of Hawaii.

Jalna Keala: Attended the meeting on behalf of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs.

Francis Oishi: Attended the meeting on behalf of the Hawaii State Department of Land and Natural Resources in support of the Aha Kiole

Henry Chang Wo: Attended from Ewa Beach and is a participant of the Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu Series. He spoke on the loss of the Hawaiian language and stressed the importance of keeping the mo'olelo (stories) of the people for the generations to come.



Mahalo to the Association for:

1. Participating in the five Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu series held in 2006 and 2007;
2. Your strong support of the Native Hawaiian communities in their quest to integrate Native Hawaiian traditional resource management methodology into existing government policy;
3. Submitting the names of the nominees to the Aha Kiolo Advisory Committee to Governor Lingle;

Since Act 212 was enacted on July 1, 2007, the Aha Kiolo Advisory Committee was selected by Governor Lingle on October 30, 2007. The Act itself will end on June 9, 2009. The Aha Moku System must be created by the general communities in the State in the space of two years.

As mandated by Act 212, an Interim Legislative Report was submitted to the Legislature in December, 2007.

Since July, the eight Kiolo members, along with the Aha Moku representatives of the 40 moku in the State of Hawaii have been very active in their communities meeting with various organizations, families and groups to explain the mandate of Act 212. This is truly a people's bill – the system will be created by the people with consultation on resource management to be done by community members of ahupua'a and moku districts specifically affected. A partial listing of the meetings attended is included in your legislative report.

The Kiolo is in the process of organizing their committee and documenting the results of these meetings to be included in the final legislative report due in December 2008.

We are so grateful to the Hawaiian Civic Clubs for their support in giving Hawaiians statewide the opportunity to work with government in protecting our Hawai'i. Now, we ask you to further support this Act by working with the Native Hawaiian practitioners in educating others on Act 212. And to join the Kiolo as they take Act 212 into the communities and embark on the creation of the Aha Moku System.

The message we leave with you today is that we thank our Lord for our beautiful Hawaii and our kupuna and their wisdom; we thank you, the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs for supporting and participating in the Aha Moku Bill. We thank you for having faith in the Hawaiian people and giving them a voice; we thank the Governor for signing this bill into law. And we ask for your continued support.

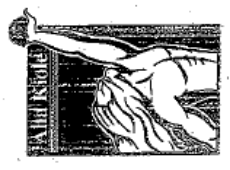

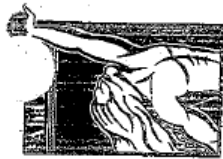

Summary

An informational meeting hosted by Aha Moku representatives on Maui was held at the Hale Nanea Building in Kahului, Maui on February 6, 2008. Present and participating in the meeting were the following moku representatives:

Aha Kiole staff: Leimana DaMate, Community Coordinator

The meeting began at 6:15pm with Pule. Facilitator Timmy Bailey began with his background of being a traditional farmer born and raised in the same generational house that will be passed to his own children. The focus of the presentation was the introduction of a generic community presentation on Act 212 and the Aha Moku System to be given at all Aha Moku community meetings.

The main focus of the meeting was to prepare Aha Moku representatives and supporters in giving informational presentations in their specific moku. A generic PowerPoint presentation was shared by Kiole Bailey and Kuloloio outlining the basic points of Act 212. Each representative was encouraged to hold their own smaller meetings in their communities and with their families to enlarge the areas of support. All present contributed to the fine-tuning of the presentation with suggestions and recommendations.

Key points of the presentation were discussed and fine-tuned to fit Maui. They included:

- The Aha Kiole will cease to exist in 2009 – Kiole are interim representatives for the communities who will be creating the Aha Moku system;
- Slide show included information on the beginning of the Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu Series and a brief summary on each of the five puwalu held;
- Puwalu basically summed up traditional resource management;

- Mission Statement must be incorporated into the Aha Moku System because this is the guideline for this system and brings focus.
- Kiolo has to do with the formation of a structure.
- On Maui, there are four specific areas that impact the people. They are: Water Resources, Land Resources, Shoreline and Ocean Resources;
- Kapalaoa. The pronunciation of place names is very important. Use Kapalaoa as an example. The Kapalaoa is the whales tooth used as a pendant. If you look at the mountain range, you can see the palaoa. This is educating people. The niho palaoa is a whale's tooth palaoa.
- Concerns including invasive species were discussed with a possible solution of looking at generational species and the methodology used to sustain them.
- Original culture vs. Modified culture was examined. There is an original strain of kalo found deep in the valley. Who knows how old it is. We know that our ancestors cross-pollinated, but let us have a voice so we can establish other solutions. We think our solutions prior to western contact worked. Let's go back and try.
- Facts. Apapane – found nowhere else in the world. We are defined as a Hawaiian culture because we are found nowhere else in the world. The natural resources gave us that identify – our culture.
- Education. Iliahi. We must educate everyone – agencies, our own people. Iliahi was thought to be extinct, but is not. Our incentive – we can find our own things, we are educators now.
- Traditional vs. modern. Traditional means the method, but we're not stupid; we're going to use the modern technology to implement our traditional methods.
- Methods. We're talking about a method, not necessarily the old materials. We're looking at traditional methods, not materials.
- Act 212 Establishment of the Aha Moku Councils. For the 1st time in history, the state of Hawaii has recognized the aha moku councils. We need you to establish the councils based on tradition.
- Ahupua'a starts from the top of the mountain, to the bottom of the ocean, and vice-versa. If you have a resource in the mountain, then there is its counterpart in the ocean. Iiwi, Hinalea iwi – land to ocean, ocean to land.
- Aha Kiolo Responsibilities. Explore, examine and derive best practice models..... We're giving you the information, now you get back to us in your area to let us know who will be the best in creating the system. Who is part of the system? All of us – we all will create the moku system to aid in the development of a comprehensive set of best practices. We must provide solutions that are not necessarily scientific but based on our environment.
- Aha Kiolo Responsibilities: get the community educated. Each ahupua'a has a different story – we have to understand that and respect that. The community must participate in this protection and preservation of the state's natural resources. Engage in discussion with and participate in meetings and events held by various moku statewide to gain perspective and develop a consensus on establishing an aha moku council system with an aha moku council commission. We're the system – everybody.
- Establish an administrative structure for the creation of an aha moku council commission to oversee an aha moku council system. The council system is the moku reps and the ahupua'a reps.

- We must leave here thinking about how we want our aha kiole person to be. What are the criteria for this person? Need grass roots election/selection process.
- Timeline: 6/30/08 – community meetings about the bill, education, community must be completed and focus must be on our own island, Maui.
- Funding has not been released, and it looks like it will not. But we are dedicated, from the beginning to the end. By 12/31 we must have a progress report.
- We will focus on the kiole first, then the moku reps and then the ahupua'a reps. By 6/30/09 the aha moku system must be created.

We must include everybody – there is no way around it. Our representatives must be pono – must educate, not dictate and must focus on the natural resources and the cultural resources.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:40 p.m.

MINUTES

An Aha Kiole Advisory Committee Community Meeting was held on Thursday, February 7, 2008 at the Haiku Community Center in Haiku, Maui. The meeting began at 6:15 p.m. with a Pule by Les Kuloloio, Kiole for Kahoolawe.

Maui Kiole Timothy Bailed gave a comprehensive presentation on Act 212, the Aha Moku System and the responsibilities of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee in bringing information to the general communities of Maui who will be creating the final Aha Moku System scheduled for completion by June 2009.

The Origin of Act 212 was examined with a brief background on the Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu series which was influenced and created by respected Hawaiian historian John Kaimikaua. The foundation of the puwalu series was an ancient prophecy stating that the core of the Hawaiian people encompassing expert resource managers could bring much needed sustainability to the natural and cultural resources of Hawaii.

Power Point Presentation

A comprehensive presentation was given by Kiole Bailey, assisted by Kiole Kuloloio on Act 212 and its impact on Maui. Main points given were:

- The Kiole are interim representatives for the communities who will be creating the Aha Moku system;
- The Aha Moku System comes from the people incorporating traditional resource management into existing regulatory policies;
- The ancient Aha Moku system was used in a peaceful time when all experts from the area were gathered together to weave different expert methodologies into one system that sustained important natural resources that is place specific. Kukaiwaa (Molokai) is the example shown that shows that specific style of fishing is different from places in Maui;
- Residents of different ahupua'a had different ways of taking care of their resources that was based on the geography and make-up of the area.
- The Mission Statement of the Aha Kiole must be incorporated into the Aha Moku System because this guideline brings focus and cohesiveness.
- The map of Mokupuni O Kahekili shows the impact of development on resources;
- There are four resources common to each ahupua'a. These are water resources, land resources, shoreline & Ocean Resources. Keeaumoku Kapu of Lahaina summed this up by stating that we are walking in our ancestors footsteps. That is what we need to do – walk in our ancestors footsteps;

- It is well known that the ahupua'a extends to the depths of the ocean. The purpose of the Aha Moku System is to look at the uses of each ahupua'a and identify the people from there with the best knowledge of the resources located in their areas;
- The pronunciation of place names is very important in educating people on the use of the land. This will help future generations in knowing what specific areas were known for in terms of resource usage;
- The original Hawaiian culture versus the modified Hawaiian culture that evolved in relation to modern social mores. The Hawaiian culture has been modified and will continue to be modified. It is now thought that solutions used prior to western contact worked. It is now necessary to retrace those methods to see if they can still work now;
- Facts. Apapane – found nowhere else in the world. We are defined as a Hawaiian culture because we are found nowhere else in the world. The natural resources gave us that identify – our culture;
- Education. Iliahi. We must educate everyone – agencies, our own people. Iliahi was thought to be extinct, but is not. Our incentive – we can find our own things, we are educators now;
- We must address the degradation of our ocean resources and stop it. Hawaiian ancestors were the masters of resource management through Hawaiian zones which still exist today;
- Traditional vs. modern. Traditional means the method, but Hawaiians were ever adaptive and will use the modern technology and tools to implement our traditional methods;
- Hawaiians must step up to the responsibility, from the ahupua'a to the moku to the island;
- Act 212 establishes the Aha Moku Councils. For the first time in history, the state of Hawaii has recognized the aha moku councils which will be on traditional resource management;
- Ahupua'a starts from the top of the mountain, to the bottom of the ocean, and vice-versa. If you have a resource in the mountain, then there is its counterpart in the ocean. Iiwi, Hinalea iwi – land to ocean, ocean to land.
- Aha Kiole Responsibilities:
 - Explore, examine and derive best practice models for each ahupua'a and area - The information on the Aha Moku System is being given to you. Now the traditional practitioners in each area must be identified as the best in creating the system. Who is part of the system? All of us – we all will create the moku system;
 - Aid in the development of a comprehensive set of best practices. We must provide solutions that are not necessarily scientific but based on our environment;
 - Methodology and expertise are the important words here – method! Pass the knowledge on. Ensure the future sustainability use of the resource;
 - Educate the community. Each ahupua'a has a different story that must be understood and respected. The community must participate in this protection and preservation of the state's natural resources. Engage in discussion with and participate in meetings and events held by various moku statewide to gain perspective and develop a consensus on

establishing an aha moku council system with an aha moku council commission. We're the system – everybody.

- An administrative structure for the creation of the moku council commission that will oversee the Aha Moku System must be created and must include Aha Moku representatives and Ahupua'a representatives chosen by the people;
- Timeline: By June 30, 2008 phase I of the community educational meetings must be completed and the next phase of actually creating the Aha Moku System must begin. Funding by the governor has not been released yet, but the dedication to seeing this system created is strong. By December 2008 we must have a final progress report. By June 30, 2009 the Aha Moku System must be created;
- The Aha Moku System will be comprised of Aha Moku Councils who will provide the bridge or vehicle to carry the methods, knowledge, protocols, ideas, practices, of specific sites to the government agencies that manage our resources;
- Traditional Aha Moku Councils were in place traditionally. These councils will be comprised of the traditional experts who must be consulted on all resource decisions. The councils must be available for consultation on issues;
- When the second round of meetings begins in July 2008, the councils must be on their way to being organized and the criteria for the Aha Moku System completed. The Aha Kiole-Aha Moku councils including the Ahupua'a committees of land, water, shoreline, ocean, burials, air (aha ahupua'a) should be completed.

The presentation was well received by the audience of approximately 65 people which included representatives of the public, county and state agencies, and traditional practitioners. The consensus at the end of the meeting was one of full support. Representatives of ahupua'a stepped forward and committed to working with the Aha Kiole in establishing the Aha Moku System in Maui.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m. with closing Pule by Kiole Leslie Kuloloio.

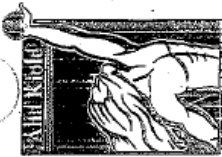

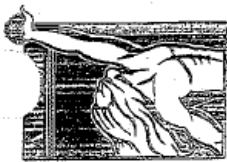

Kahoolawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC) Meeting
Hale Maha'olu Ekolu, Wai'ehu, Maui
February 12, 2008

Summary

The Kahoolawe Island Reserve Commission Meeting was held on Tuesday, February 12, 2008 at the Hale Maha'olu Ekolu Building in Wai'ehu Maui. Facilitated by KIRC Chair, Emmett Aluli, the meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m.

Present were KIRC Members:

Dr. Noa Emmett Aluli (Chair), representing the Protect Kahoolawe 'Ohana (PKO)
Dr. Charles Burrows, representing the Aha Hui Malama I Ka Lokahi, Native Hawaiian organizations
Milton Arakawa, Director of the Dept. of Public Works & Environment, representing Maui County
Laura Thielen, Director of the Dept. of Land and Natural Resources, representing the State of Hawaii
Craig Neff, representing the Protect Kahoolawe 'Ohana
Robert Luuwai, representing the Protect Kahoolawe 'Ohana
John Waihee, IV, representing the Office of Hawaiian Affairs

Presentations

Dr. Frank Stanton – Presentation on Coral

Dr. Stanton reported that an unusual coral species was discovered in the nearshore of the south side of Kahoolawe. While conducting tissue analysis at the University of Hawaii, five species of coral were discovered to have a coral disease. The tissue samples were sent to the U.S. Geological Survey on the mainland where six samples showed an invasion of infection of fungi in the coral.

Dr. Stanton explained that this was the first time that the coral off of Kahoolawe had been documented with tissue samples. When asked by KIRC members whether or not the fungi were caused by sedimentation, Dr. Stanton replied that there were more questions than answers. He requested approval of a manuscript to be written that would publicly describe the fungi and the problem. The manuscript would focus on Hawaii, but Kahoolawe would not be specifically mentioned. Dr. Stanton also asked for permission to return to the site of the diseased coral for additional surveys. The coral studied is a species that is indigenous to Hawaii.

Concerned with the impact to Native Hawaiian cultural practices, KIRC asked that the cultural intellectual property rights be looked at; that the report be orientated to the cultural customs on Kahoolawe; that the mindset of the report be one on cultural sensitivity; and that Native Hawaiian practitioners be respected in further work.

In answer to questions from KIRC, Dr. Stanton stated that the fungi was found in about five to fifteen feet of water off the south side of Kahoolawe; that not all coral colonies were infected; that the limu growing on the infected coral was not surveyed nor was the typed of fish that fed off of that coral; that it was not known if the fungi was destroying the coral; or if the fungi could have been caused by military bombs.

KIRC permitted the fungi slides to be stored at the USGS NW Health Center under archive conditions until a Memorandum of Agreement is completed between the USGS and KIRC. Decision would be deferred until the next meeting.

Ken Wood and Chris Swenson – Presentation on Flora found on Kahoolawe

A report was given by Chris Swenson and Ken Wood, scientists who are monitoring and evaluating the biological composition of plants for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife. They asked permission of the KIRC to collect species of flora on Kahoolawe and be allowed access to the island for their research. Permission was granted subject to specific conditions levied by KIRC.

Pua Kanahale – Presentation on the Kahoolawe Cultural Use Draft Plan

The Kahoolawe Cultural Use Draft Plan (CUDP) was presented by Pua Kanahale of the Edith Kanakaole Foundation. Ms. Kanahale began by stating that the foundation of the CDUP was based on the Hawaiian god Kanaloa, the deity of ocean elements. The success of the CDUP is dependent on the public's need to expand their thinking on how they fit into the universe. The island does have the ability to reproduce through spawning.

The CUDP begins with the identification and protection of *wahi pana* on Kahoolawe. The island can not be allowed to become a vacation spot, but must retain the *wahi pana* status.

Ms. Kanahale explained the volcanic history of Kahoolawe which is estimated to be 750,000 years old and its relationship to the Pele mythology

Throughout her presentation, Ms. Kanahale offered recommendations for the CUDP after each slide. Those recommendations are:

- That KIRC work toward the goal of changing Kahoolawe's political standing to that of becoming an ahupua'a of Makawai, Maui;
- That the island of Kahoolawe be known as *Mokupuni O Kanaloa*;
- That this new *Mokupuni O Kanaloa* have one district or moku; and that the moku be known as Kahoolawe;
- That *Aina pana O Kanapou*, the ancestral repository of Kahoolawe be protected;
- That traditional place names be protected;
- That all known 'ili (smaller land sections) be changed to *ahupua'a* (traditional land segments);
- That known boundaries be re-surveyed for accuracy;
- That boundary *ahu* be constructed mauka and makai;
- That a trail system be established connecting the *ahu*;

- That activities for each ahupua'a be created to draw people to the place;
- That the KIRC protect the Kahoolawe 'Ohana and other concerned citizens by selecting a committee for the task of establishing the above tasks;
- That the "LZ" sites acquire Hawaiian names unless a specific site has a given Hawaiian name and that site names be considered for persons who have passed away;
- That the function of *Laka* (Hawaiian goddess of hula) is as important as *Lono* (a primary Hawaiian god). The hula honors the ancestors. More hula halau must be invited to be a part of Kahoolawe;
- That *Ku'ula* (god of the ocean) deals with the image of the ocean and personal ceremonies of fishermen must be included in Kahoolawe's cultural plan;
- That the clean-up of Site 101, *Pua Moiwi* and others be done quickly;
- That the *Loa'a* Stone be moved to save it from the eroding gulch where it is presently located;
- That two house sites be established in the south village.

Ms. Kanahale also spoke of working on the wetlands of Kahoolawe where copa and Kawelo seeds will be planted. A June ceremony is being planned when another summary will be presented.

Comments from Commissioners on the draft Cultural Plan as presented

Comments from the KIRC included:

- Kanepo Cave* was a huge cave that the Navy exploded – on that cliff side there is a burial cave found in 1948 where a large canoe can be seen from the pali;
- Hanakalai and Molokini* were not mentioned in the cultural presentation;
- KIRC has been challenged in the past on the *Wahi Pana* and on religious ceremonies versus cultural ceremonies. Whether a ceremony is religious or cultural, does it follow accepted law? Ms. Kanahale stated that there is no distinction between religious and cultural ceremonies. They are one and the same and are based on the elements that maintain life in a Hawaiian perspective.

Kiole Leslie Kuloloio – Aha Kiole Presentation
Leimana DaMate, Aha Kiole Community Coordinator

Kiole Leslie Kuloloio gave an educational presentation on the Aha Kiole Advisory Commission and Act 212. He briefly described the origin of the Act and the Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu Series then focused on the *Na Mo'o Kuauhau O Kahoolawe* (The birthing of Maui, Molokini and Kahoolawe). Discussed in his presentation were:

- The *Papa Kai 'Ohana* and *Na Kupuna O Kahoolawe* – the traditional ocean families and kupuna who hold the knowledge of the seas surrounding Kahoolawe;
- The *Aukai, Ko'ie'ie, Lanaau* – the ocean currents that impact Kahoolawe;
- The *Kanaka Lawaia* (traditional fishermen) and how the *Kohola* (whales) are attracted to Kahoolawe because of its coral beds;
- The *Ohua* (juvenile states) of the *manini* and its relationship to the land of Kahoolawe;

- The traditional place names of Kahoolawe as known by the generational lawaia including Kiole Kuloloio’s ancestors, Tutu John Awaloa and Tutu Kauwekane;
- The relationship between the *naia* (dolphins) and Kahoolawe;
- The traditional knowledge of the *mahiai* (farmers) of Kahoolawe; and,
- The traditional relationship between Kahoolawe and Molokini.

The presentation was well received with a request from KIRC for Kiole Kuloloio to work closely with Pua Kanahela on updating the Kahoolawe Cultural Plan to include the ocean aspects. This will help to bring KIRC into alignment with Act 212 and the Kiole mandate of integrating traditional resource knowledge into existing government policy.

Manuel Kuloloio – Request for access to Kahoolawe for Billy Mitchell

Manuel “Manny” Kuloloio requested permission to access Kahoolawe for Kahu Billy Mitchell with no precise date specified. The purpose of entry is education. The KIRC discussed the issue focusing on safety, healing and closure for families connected to Kahoolawe. Decision to approve access was deferred until a future date.

Summary

The KIRC meeting was well attended by approximately 35 people. All presentations were well accepted and the Aha Kiole presentation was approved and supported by the KIRC and the audience. Plans for further discussion on how KIRC can be aligned with the Aha Kiole were made between the Commissioners and Kiole Leslie Kuloloio.

Oahu Kiole Charles Kapua met with representatives of concerned fishing groups on Wednesday, February 13, 2008 in downtown Honolulu at 5:00 p.m.

Present at the meeting were Tony Costa, Michael O'Connell, Roy Fujioka who represented fishing groups in Leeward Oahu.

Kiole Kapua gave a presentation on Act 212 and the role of the Aha Kiole in the community after which comments were heard and questions answered. Comments from the group were:

- A request to add Kiole responsibilities into any educational presentation to be given to the communities;
- Use one model of community participation on all islands;
- The presentation can not be focused only on Hawaiians, but must be presented in a universal tone to include all ethnic races;

After discussion and dialogue, all present agreed that Hawaiians, being the first people of Hawaii, had a system that worked. And, because the systems used in this century are not working in sustaining the resources, the Aha Moku System is a way to explore the traditional system that was brought forth by Hawaiian ancestors to see if this will work successfully in the 21st century.

Summary

An Aha Moku gathering was held at the Kauai Hilton Hotel in Lihue, Kauai on Monday, February 25, 2008 at 6:30 p.m. Hosted by the participants of the Ho’ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu Series, those gathered focused on Act 212 and the informational presentation to be given to communities in public forums.

Present from Kauai were: Sharon Pomroy, Kiolo and Koolau; Kalehua Ham Young, Halele’a; Billy Kaohelaulii and Terri Hayes, Kona; Kealoha Figaroa, Koolau; Mahilani Sylva, Kona.

Present from Niihau were: Ilei Beniamina, Kiolo; Kahea and Jay Niau, Ella Kanahale, Awapuhi and Kalei Kahale.

The gathering focused on learning the prepared presentation on Act 212 and the best way to approach their moku communities and local governmental agencies. Potential concerns were discussed with the consensus that outcomes of meetings must include a general agreement to and support of the Aha Moku System. Commitment to the Aha Moku process was reinforced with enthusiasm.

Connections between practitioner families and traditional districts

Gathered at this session were respected kupuna from the traditional ahupua’a and moku in Kauai and Niihau. In discussion, they reminisced about their foundations of knowledge handed down to them by their kupuna. The important connections between the land and sea and the families were examined with the statement that each of the practitioners listed in the table below were responsible for the traditional practices, methodologies and the handing down of this knowledge not previously known outside of their families to their descendants. The families listed were the traditional konohiki of the specific ahupua’a. This kuleana, responsibility for these areas, has been handed down to the next generation. Each of these families needs to be contacted through the Aha Moku representatives and assistance given to them through the Aha Moku Councils to sustain their knowledge and protect these resources.

MINUTES

An Aha Kiole Advisory Committee Community Meeting was held on Wednesday, February 26, 2008 at the University of Hawaii in Lihue, Kauai. The meeting began at 6:45 p.m. with a Pule by Ilei Beniamina, Kiole for Niihau.

Facilitated by Kiole Sharon Pomroy of Kauai, and Kiole Ilei Beniamina of Niihau, Act 212, the Aha Moku System and the responsibilities of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee were discussed as well information to be given to the general communities of Kauai and Niihau who will be creating the final Aha Moku System scheduled for completion by June 2009.

The Origin of Act 212 was examined with a brief background on the Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu series which was influenced and created by respected Hawaiian historian John Kaimikaua. The foundation of the puwalu series was set in an ancient prophecy that foretold the rising of the *Makaainana* (general population of the Hawaiian people) on the crest of a wave. Kupuna interpretation of the prophecy is that the people of Hawaii, including expert resource managers would step forward to bring much needed sustainability to the natural and cultural resources of Hawaii.

Power Point Presentation

An informational presentation on Act 212, the vehicle created at the 2007 Hawaii State Legislature to shape the process for the Aha Moku System was well received by the audience. Included in the presentation was a live video clip of Aha Kiole Chair, Vanda Hanakahi who explained the beginnings and mission of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee; and, a live clip of John Kaimikaua who explained the meaning and depth of an Aha Kiole.

Prior to the community meeting, there were misconceptions and misinterpretations of what Act 212 was about, and how the Kiole could assist the communities in addressing resource issues in their respective moku. Comments and questions were accepted from the audience and included:

- People must unite now to protect ocean and land natural resources;
- Assurances that voices will be heard through the Aha Moku meetings;
- A public education campaign must begin to inform the public about the Aha Moku System;

- Better notice of meetings must be given to the public (Mahilani Sylva volunteered at the meeting to post all Kauai and Niihau community meetings in advance);
- The knowledge of the kupuna is a connection to the past and a link to the future;

Aha Moku Representatives

Act 212 was derived from the participation of expert traditional resource managers and kupuna from every island in the Ho’ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu Series. Those who contributed from Kauai shared their experiences and knowledge. All stressed the importance of creating An Aha Moku System and committed to holding Aha Moku meetings in their specific moku. They were: Tommy Hashimoto of the Moku of Halele’a, Ahupua’a of Hanalei and Ha’ena; Kalehua Ham Young of the Moku of Halele’a, Ahupua’a of Wainiha; and, Billy Kaohelaulii, Moku of Kona, Ahupua’a of Weliweli.

Northwest Hawaiian Islands and Fishing Concerns

Concerns were voiced on the fishing regulations for the Northwest Hawaiian Islands and for the waters surrounding Niihau and Kauai. And, although specific issues were not the focus of this meeting, members of the audience expressed their feelings on fishing closures in the islands traditionally fished above Niihau. There was fear that politics were taking over the generational rights to fishing in Hawaii’s northern waters. Direct comments from the audience included:

- Local fishermen have fished for over 20 years off of Niihau and Kaula Rock. There is no shortage of fish as reported by state agencies;
- People in Hawaii need and want locally caught fish;
- When local fishermen catch fish off of Niihau, they always give much of it to the communities of Niihau;
- Recommendation given that all fishing done off of Nohili Point be given to the people of Niihau;
- There is a fear among commercial fishermen that the Robinsons are using their influence at the Legislature to create a new way to control the waters within 3-miles off of Niihau. This is considered not fair to fishermen who have traditionally fished these waters as there are areas off the coast of Niihau that are considered deep waters;
- Niihau is not over-fished in the deep waters off of Niihau;
- Why is attention not focused on the fuel tank barges and the military ships larger than 200-feet that are consistently stripping their lines in Niihau channels?

Summary

The meeting in Kauai was well attended by approximately 65 residents of Kauai and Niihau. Misconceptions that the Aha Kiolo Advisory Committee and the Aha Moku System were created only for Hawaiians were cleared up. It was stressed that the Aha Moku System is for everyone in Hawaii and all must participate in order for it to be successful. Aha Moku representatives committed to going out into their specific

communities to inform and educate on the merits of Act 212 and the importance of the Aha Moku System. A stronger rapport was developed between Hawaiian practitioners from both Kauai and Niihau with the general fishing community.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m. with closing Pule by Kiole Ilei Beniamina.

Report

The Legislative Hawaiian Caucus held a “Hawaiian Day” at the Hawaii State Capitol on March 19, 2008. The event featured native Hawaiian practitioners, informational and educational displays by native Hawaiian non-profit organizations, state agencies, groups, community members and entertainers who work with and continue to improve the quality of life for native Hawaiians.

Organized by Representative Mele Carroll, Chair of the Hawaiian Caucus, the event hosted a large number of organizations working with Hawaiian issues. The theme of the event was “Ho’omau I Ka Ho’iho’i I Ke Kumu”, (Perpetuate and Restore the Knowledge of the Source).

The Aha Kiolo Advisory Committee participated with an informational table, Phase I brochures and displays of the traditional maps of all the islands. Sign up sheets were available for those who wish to be on the Aha Kiolo mailing list. Attending from the Kiolo were: Kiolo Charles Kapua, Oahu; Kiolo Winnie Basques, Lana’i; Kiolo Buttons Lovell, Hawaii; Mahi Sylva, Aha Moku representative from Kaua’i; and Leimana DaMate, Community Coordinator.

A floor presentation was given in the Senate Chambers by Senator Kalani English of Maui who honored Ali’i Nui Clifford Hashimoto of the State of Hawaii Royal Order of Kamehameha and the 2008 Grammy Award Winners. Included as part of the Grammy Award Winners was Richard and Ululani Ho’opii, Aha Moku representatives from Maui.

A separate floor presentation was given in the House Chambers by Representative Mele Carroll and Representative Angus McKelvey, both from Maui also honoring the Royal Order of Kamehameha and the Grammy Award winners.

There was a steady stream of people visiting the Kiolo table who were interested in the concept of An Aha Moku System. It was clear that a strong public relations program must be created as soon as funds are available. Too many people do not know about Act 212 and community involvement. Kiolo and Aha Moku Representatives already identified must take a stronger pro-active role in reaching the public.

April 2008

Puwalu of QLCC, Substance Abuse Programs from Hilo, Honolulu and Kane'ohe

Date of Meeting: April 10th and 11th 2008

Puwalu was third called for the purpose of discussing the establishment of an 'Aha Kiole to advise the Dept. of Health.

Following a recap of the past two puwalu by Barbara Kalipi, Molokai QLCC director, Hui Ho'ola I na Nahulu shared what their program does in Hilo. Aunty Pearl Ululani Kanaka'ole is the kupuna for Hui Ho'ola who guides the staff and participants in Hawaiian protocol.

Programs such as E Ho'omanamaiola of O'ahu and Kahua Ola Hou of Molokai incorporate Hawaiian practices and protocols in their program—ho'oponopono, lo'i kalo, etc. and they are documenting the success of such practices. Families are included in their program because holistic healing is practiced in the Hawaiian 'ohana.

Vanda Hanakahi shared a power point presentation on the 'Aha Kiole and there was great interest. When asked how many people in the room never heard of the 'Aha Kiole, no one raised their hand. Recognizing the kuleana of each ahupua'a and moku and the work already being done within these boundaries to protect and perpetuate resources using Hawaiian methodologies is very positive. Puwalu participants are ha'aheo of their place and feel this is an inclusive process.

BREAKOUT SESSION WITH KUPUNA – Fri. 4/11/08

Vanda Hanakahi met with six hulu kupuna from Keauhou/Kona, Hawaii; Waialua, O'ahu; Hilo, Hawaii and Ka'a'awa, O'ahu.

Recognizing that at the heart of the 'Aha Kiole is the 'ike kupuna, it was important to meet with these kupuna to discuss their expertise and how it can help their community, island, this generation and generations to come.

Our session began with ho'olauna (introductions) and genealogy back to their grandparents. We all had ties back to Kohala, Hawaii. The oldest of the kupuna, Lily Kong of Keauhou, Hawaii stated that we are 'ohana therefore we can speak/share openly and freely. Each kupuna shared their own Hawaiian practice passed down from their kupuna and about their 'aina. Two talked about their method of fishing and the protocols their family followed before, during and after lawai'a.

This breakout session was filmed; however, I assured the kupuna that it was for our eyes only and each would receive a DVD of it. I will cull what can be shared and put it into a written report for QLCC, our sponsor for this puwalu.

Mabel Tolentino and Bernie Cacauidis of Kamuela will work with Buttons to set up community meeting for Kohala. 2nd meeting in Kohala to be done by Mike Isaacs.

Maui – complying with Haiku, Pukalani, Waiehu, Hana, Maui and Kahoolawe have almost completed presentations to all of the moku on Maui. Working on criteria for selecting Aha moku for Maui. Sign in sheets for attendees most important. Les and Timmy did video on Akaku on Aha Ki`ole.

Kaho'olawe – presentation made to the Kaho'olawe commission. Presentation needs to be made on Lana'i to find practitioners of Kaho'olawe uses. The Kupuna are gone and would have to meet with PKO people. Possibility of piggy-backing on Lana'i and Molokai meetings for Kahoolawe although it would be better to have a separate meeting. Research currently being done on finding traditional families from Maui, Molokai, and Lanai who have traditionally used Kahoolawe waters. Have relayed the following names to Vanda and Les. Examples:

Lana'i – Gary Suzuki, Kai Kanno, Cockett Family

Molokai – Yama, Joyce (from Halawa), Kawano family

Kaua'i – Ilei doing presentations on Kaua'i for Aha Ki`ole. Ilei doing community meetings on Kaua'i presenting on Aha Ki`ole. Koloa has scheduled for AK meetings, Hanalei is coming up on Friday. KCC, KCC, Koloa, Anahola, presentations already made. April 22, May 22- Koloa, Guava Kai conf room April 18 all at 6:00 PM Have been in contact with Ilei and Sharon on meetings. Will be receiving reports from the KCC, Koloa, Anahola meetings from Ilei for report. Have been asked to attend Hanalei meeting on 4/18. Will stay with Ilei. Tommy Hashimoto has a viable working model of the Aha Moku system.

Lana'i – May 14 meeting on Lana'i return on Thursday. Kupuna Irene Cockett and Onaona Maly are working with me in contacting community leaders for Lana'i meeting.

Moloka`i – May 13 meeting on Moloka`i to look for Kaho`olawe meetings. In process of setting up meetings with Kiole and DHHL/Kammy Purdy in Hoolehua for May.

O`ahu – meetings held with hunters. May 7, 2008 meeting tentatively scheduled, May 21

Punaluu QLCC. Compiling list of possible community / organization meetings for Oahu for April / May. Includes meeting with DHHL, KS, Herb Lee, Vicky Holt Takamine/ `Ilio (Spoke with Vicky on 4/17)

Memo from Chair of Aha Ki`ole requesting support of Civic Clubs.

Uncle Les complete the presentation does not answer questions until end of the presentation. He recommended use of media. Buttons get in with Hale Kuamo`o for assistance in media.

May 21, 2008 AK meeting in AM Punaluu meeting in PM.
This is a “kuka” session, not a formal meeting.

Informational Meeting- Held at Po'ipu Beach Pavilion Time- 7:05 p.m. Date - April 22, 2008

A pule was said by Mahelani Silva.

A CD of the Aha Kiole Council was shown.

Mahelani discussed more about the Aha Kiole system. She also announced that the DLNR is supposed to be watching over the aina, but in reality what has happened, is all the natural resources are diminishing before our eyes. So we need to bring the management of the aina and natural resources of our kupuna back into practice for our aina and families.

Billy Kaohelaulii announced that we need to ask for the communities help in identifying what was done in the past, so we can continue with the kupuna understanding of the seasons and the Kapu system of all fishing and land management.

Ilei Mentioned that the Kona district, actually stretches from the Mahaleapu area to the Kalalau area. She also said that the Bill of Act 212 is a bill which enables the Hawaiian people to take care of their kuleana and manage our resources. Also was mentioned that the Aha Kiole Council will have a new system in about a year. By then, all of the Moku and Konohiki will be established.

Billy mentioned about the people with swimming pools along the coastline, should be checked, if any of the chlorine is being dumped, accidentally or purposely into the ocean. As well as all of the construction chemicals being used. Making sure all the chemicals are safely placed away from any runoff from rainfall into the ocean. Billy went on to say that all of the fish is being over fished and we need to have a Kapu system in effect.

Juan Wilson mentioned if it was possible to open up the Kane-I-Olo-Uma Heiau fishponds, to raise fish to reflowerish the ocean? And also all the Fishponds that were once located on the coastline of Po'ipu?

Billy mentioned that most of the fishponds that Po'ipu had were actually covered by the developing and established hotels. The only fishponds not covered or partially not covered are the Kane-I- Olo-Uma fishponds, and we have no funding to help get it cleared and established yet. Its entrance that once led out to sea is covered by the parking lot next to Brenneke Restaurant.

Juan Wilson said that his theory is food is the critical path for the community to survive. Maybe a fishpond should be established soon.

Ilei went on to mention that we needed to find out what permits or recommendation could we use to help the culture and resource of our ocean remain useful for the future of our heirs. If at all possible to open up that fishpond of the Kane-I-Olo-Uma Heiau. She also mentioned, if we build a moku, it needs to be planned out very carefully. And it might be able to be designated as an archeological preserve or moratorium. We must find all the intact Heiau and put a Kapu on it in each of our Ahupua'a.

Billy announced that it would be wise to contact our kupuna and other fellow fishermen and gather together to find a solution and / or a system for the management of the land and sea.

Makana went on to mention about the Kuleana Lands. How to help our ohana to protect their lands from being taken away for back taxes, it's a way to establish your property into Kuleana Lands and pay a reasonable property tax for your land and home. Too many families are unable to afford their taxes to keep their homes, which result in homeless Hawaiian families who inherit their property or is just trying to live in their home land. We need to protect our land and ohana, living here to keep our culture alive.

Ending the meeting with a pule was Ilei Beniamina Meeting adjourned @ 8:15 p.m.

Call to Order

Chair Arnold Lum called the meeting to order at 10:35 a.m. Everyone introduced themselves.

Announcements

Donna Wong requested that members of MACZAC participate in the federal evaluation of the Hawaii CZM Program, scheduled to take place in late July-early August. Which islands the federal evaluation team holds interviews on will impact which members represent MACZAC.

Arnold Lum reported on the 5 public meetings he attended about the parking at Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor. Arnold attended the DOBOR meetings in his capacity as the chair of MACZAC's Shoreline Access & Coastal Parking Working Group. At the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor, DOBOR proposes to start charging commercial rates to park. BLNR voted that DOBOR can raise parking rates to the maximum charged by the City & County of Honolulu in its municipal lots (\$1.50 per hour). It looks like 300 of the 550 total parking spaces will be open for a limited time (approx. 4 hours) for ocean recreation users only, and the remaining 250 parking spaces will charge \$1.50 per hour.

The 2008 International Year of the Reef (IYOR) was discussed. Donna Brown publicized the IYOR Reef Night event to be held at the Maui Ocean Center on June 22. Makaala Kaumoana noted that in honor of the IYOR as well as the 10th anniversary of the American Heritage Rivers Initiative, the Hanalei Watershed Hui will present the He Puko`a kani `aina event in Hanalei's Blackpot Park on August 30.

Approval of the March 7, 2008 Meeting Minutes

Minutes were unanimously approved.

CZM Hawaii Program Report

See attached report for May 9, 2008 prepared by Douglas Tom, Hawaii CZM Program Manager.

Hawaii Ocean Resources Management Plan (ORMP) & Moku Management Project Overview

Marnie Meyer, Hawaii CZM Program employee, reported that the ORMP Policy Group had its biannual meeting on April 9. In addition, the ORMP Working Group has been meeting monthly. Arnold Lum is MACZAC's representative to the ORMP Policy Group and Jim Coon is MACZAC's representative to the ORMP Working Group. All meeting agendas and summaries are available online on the CZM website.

Marnie noted that there is a requirement to update the ORMP every 5 years. Issues that the ORMP Working and Policy Groups have been focusing on include public outreach, rule and legislative changes, budget assessment, cross-sector collaboration, government-community collaboration, networking, climate change, clean and renewable energy, future priorities, and strengthening participation in the Working Group and Policy Group. Marnie reported that MACZAC's assistance will be sought with the ORMP outreach strategy to get public input from across the islands statewide. MACZAC members suggested that it was important for communities to be able to clarify 'what the ORMP means to them.' MACZAC

members suggested identifying the communities and local groups that are already actively involved with these issues and then bringing them into partnerships with government through outreach efforts.

Sue Sakai opined that the public wants less planning and more implementation. Jim Coon responded that it really depends on the issue – some are ready to go right away and others are still emerging and need more community involvement. Donna Wong objected that there are not enough community groups present on the ORMP Policy Group, only MACZAC; thus policies are actually already set by the time the public gets involved and is supposed to help with implementation. If something is a fait accompli then it's not genuine collaboration and there will be community opposition.

Melissa Iwamoto, Hawaii CZM Program employee, reported that the Hawaii Community Stewardship Report and Directory have been completed and are now available online on the CZM website. Melissa informed MACZAC that CZM is currently discussing how to proceed with this project – to gather additional input on the framework within the Report and to begin implementation through demonstration projects. CZM is specifically looking to Molokai for a possible demonstration project. MACZAC members provided Melissa with suggestions on many levels, including implementing pilots in a couple of communities and working with local groups that are already familiar with this process and the issues. MACZAC members noted that several local community groups are already involved in partnership projects with government agencies and provided examples. Basically, MACZAC suggested that CZM start this work with focused communities, go through the entire process with them, and then build up from there.

‘Aha Kiole Advisory Committee Presentation

Leimana DaMate, Community Coordinator for the ‘Aha Kiole Advisory Committee, gave a presentation on the Committee's schedule of meetings, work to date, and future plans. The Committee is going out to the communities to inform them about ACT 212, which went into effect on July 1, 2007. It is estimated that there are 864 ahupuaa and 40 moku statewide. The Committee will also be going into the communities to document specifics by location, including the area's resources, geography, topography, traditional practitioners, and genealogical experts.

Leimana reported that the Committee has still not yet received any government funding and so looks forward to the release of the appropriated funds. The Committee is based in DLNR rather than OHA because its kuleana is to help sustain Hawaii's resources. Their vision is: "To incorporate appropriate Native Hawaiian knowledge and protocols for the preservation, cultivation and management of all Native Hawaiian natural and cultural resources for future generations." Leimana explained that the ‘Aha Kiole Advisory Committee is an interim entity only and its role is to kick-start the process and both inform the public and advise the State Legislature on the creation of an ‘Aha Moku Council which will, in turn, then advise the State on Native Hawaiian resource management practices. The ‘Aha Kiole Advisory Committee is working with communities to develop consensus on establishing the ‘Aha Moku Council Commission and selecting their island's representative.

‘Aha Moku Research Group Update

Walter Ritte gave an update on his meetings with UH-Manoa faculty and students regarding moku management issues. The group envisions that MACZAC and DLNR could collaborate on connecting traditional Native Hawaiian resource management practices to the existing State and County government apparatuses. Professor Noelani Goodyear-Kaopua gave a presentation on the group's pilot project proposal that focuses on that connection interfacing at the level of the Special Management Area (SMA) permitting

procedures and the County decision-making processes. The pilot project would document just how such an interface could actually work, and could serve as a model which could be extended statewide. Walter and Noe then submitted a draft ‘Aha Moku Research Group/Hui Kuleana budget proposal. It was decided that Walter would contact the CZM Program and Vanda Hanakahi (‘Aha Kiole Advisory Committee) to discuss initiating the pilot project.

New Business

Agenda Items for the Next MACZAC Meeting:

At the next MACZAC meeting, members would like to discuss coastal hazards, global warming and sea level rise, open-ocean marine aquaculture, and how to determine coastal carrying capacities.

Hawaii Conservation Conference:

The Hawaii Conservation Conference will be held from July 29-August 1, 2008 at the Hawaii Convention Center. The theme is “Island Ecosystems” in honor of the International Year of the Reef.

Hawaii Congress of Planning Officials (HCPO) Conference:

The Hawaii Congress of Planning Officials Conference will be held from September 10-12, 2008 at the Grand Wailea Resort on Maui. The theme is “Planning Island Style”.

Adjournment and Next Meeting Date

Chair Arnold Lum adjourned the meeting at 2:25 p.m.

The next MACZAC meeting is scheduled for September 12, 2008 at the Grand Wailea Resort on Maui. The MACZAC meeting will immediately follow the conclusion of the Hawaii Congress of Planning Officials Conference.

MINUTES

Call to Order

The Waianae Moku Meeting was called to order by Facilitator Gege Kawelo on Friday, May 9, 2008 at 6:30 p.m. The meeting was held in the small conference room in the Waianae District Community Center. Pule was given by Ruby Maunakea.

This moku meeting was hosted by the Waianae and Nanakuli Hawaiian Civic Clubs. Sign-In sheet attached. Invited to be resource speakers were Kiole Charles Kapua and Leimana Damate, Community Coordinator of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee.

Background of Act 212

The focus of the meeting was to examine Act 212, signed into law in June, 2007 by Governor Lingle, to look at the establishment of the Aha Moku Systems as mandated by the Act, and to explore Native Hawaiian practitioner methodology as practiced by traditional fishermen and farmers.

A video presentation was given by Kiole Kapua featuring Vanda Hanakahi, Chair of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee and John Kaimikaua, advocate of the Kiole system as traditionally practiced in Molokai.

Act 212 was created to give communities a voice in natural and cultural protection as it relates to resources. Main points given in the presentation included:

- Communities must take responsibility of their ahupua'a, from the 'aina to the kai;
- Communities must take care of their ahupua'a by picking their leaders who will assist in issue identification;
- Each ahupua'a is unique with specific resources – they must be identified;
- Solutions to issues must be examined;

Community Comments

At the conclusion of the presentation, members of the audience gave input, comments and identified issues affecting their moku and ahupua'a for which they felt the Aha Moku System could assist. These included:

- The term "aho" in relation to Aha Kiole is not a term commonly used on Oahu. ("Aho" is a Moloka'i term used temporarily until the correct term for each island is identified and approved. It was acknowledged that terminology in relation to

resource management and cultural practices are specific to each island and moku.)

- Issue: Ways must be found within the moku to stop development from adversely impacting areas traditionally used for farming and fishing;
- Issue: Water treatment plants are not good for the coastal areas;
- Concern: It is difficult now to get anything done in Waianae – agencies do not care about the ahupua’a system and it is too difficult to build coalitions in any community. Response from Kupuna: This is a different time from when our ancestors took care of the resources. However, the ancient system worked because it was centered on the resource – it can work today.
- Concern: There are 1600 units of affordable housing to be built on the Waianae coast. The government will not listen to our concern that this will affect our watershed and our estuaries;
- If the community comes together to base a plan on the ahupua’a principles, how can this help? (Response) The agencies will know who to talk to in the community – that is a first step.
- We must initiate our seasonal closures on fishing and farming. Our traditional practices are still being used regularly but government and scientists who are not from here do not acknowledge this because they do not know it. We must teach.
- Concern: Neighborhood Boards only help developers, and they are connected only to the City and County of Honolulu.
- Concern: Boundaries must be established on the ahupua’a to determine who has jurisdiction and resources, both past and present, must be identified.

Review of Community Meetings Schedule

It was agreed upon by the participants at this meeting to meet again in two weeks, as well as to set up meetings in ahupua’a communities. This conversation must be continued with more discussion. Four ahupua’a were represented at this meeting through traditional practitioner families connected generationally to the areas – Makaha, Nanakuli, Lualualei, and Waianae.

Summary

Act 212 was created to give communities in an ahupua’a a chance to create a best-practices moku system that is site specific and based on the resources in that particular ahupua’a. The time-frame to create this is critical as the Act sunsets in 2009. Ahupua’a representatives who attended this meeting agreed that more discussion is needed, and that each ahupua’a must meet to discuss the creation and ramifications of a moku system.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m. with a closing pule by Kupuna Ruby Maunakea.

Meetings seek input and leaders for 'Aha Moku advisory body

A second round of public meetings are planned starting in July to begin to select leaders from each island to take part in 'Aha Moku Councils, which will advise the state on Native Hawaiian resource management practices.

A separate informational meeting for Moloka'i is planned for June 5, 6:30 p.m. at Kulua 'Ōwi, Queen Lili'uokalani Children's Center, 'Uluhaimāmalama Room. "The meeting is to inform about the aha moku system as well as to gather those who are practitioners: mahi'ai (farmer), lapa'au (medicine), kawā'a (fisherman) and even those in hula that are familiar with the waterways from the mountain to the ocean," said Vanda Hanakahi, chairwoman of the 'Aha Kiole Advisory Committee.

The 'aha moku system is site-specific to each ahupua'a, accounting for varying resources and seasons, Hanakahi said.

At the meeting, practitioners will also be able to learn from each other. Mac Poepee, kahu of Mo'omomi Beach in Hoolehua, Moloka'i, provides a "good model of management following Hawaiian practices" and could serve as a model for other islands, she said. Poepee "follows the seasons and he's very strict about who is allowed in," she said. Day fishing, for example, is restricted to kōpuna and those who are unable to go out to do deep-ocean fishing, she said. Under Poepee's guidance, studies at Mo'omomi are examining uhu spawning and how moon cycles affect the eating habit of fish, she said.

Community coordinator Leimana DaMate, said the creation of the 'Aha Moku Advisory Committee by law in 2007 allows for Native Hawaiian traditional and generational resource management to have a say in what needs to be done in areas like development and fishing. "This is going to be the first time our people are going to have a voice in resource management that's systematic by law," she said.

The councils will take into account things like seasonal differences that "vary from island to island and moku to moku," she said. The moon calendar, for example, is "days off in different parts of the state," affecting things like spawning seasons, she said.

Les Kuloloio, the committee's Kaho'olawe representative, said past practices – specific to each area – will be used to protect the state's natural resources. "One of the problems we're finding is water issues on every island is different, natural resources issues are different, and everybody should not be wearing a size 8 shoe," he said. "Everybody has to wear their own shoes that fits their islands and keeps their uniqueness."

"We need to respect Hawaiian science and culture," he added. "It's not 'versus' (western) science, but to show their are differences of our knowledge of how we should be protecting our natural resources, the 'āina, especially the water, land, shoreline and ocean and everything that deals with our Hawai'i."

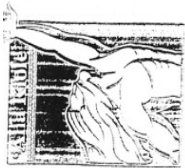

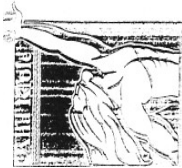

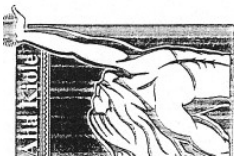

Discussion: Often the groups of islands are called Pae' Aina – this means all of the islands. Defining the Pae' Aina are all of the islands of Hawaii including the NWHI – the entire archipelago.

When one looks at the geological make up of the islands, the word "pae" can be used to describe how the islands are situated. It is also used as when the wave comes in, it "pae" on the sand. The ocean will lay out whatever comes in from the sea on the sand. Anything that lands on the shore is to pae. When one looks at the islands, it is the "lay" of the land. There are different usages for the word "pae". Another "pae" is the different levels.

Native Hawaiian and Hawaiian appears throughout6 the document for various reasons. Those 3 terms would be used in appropriate places through out the document.

explanation of He Kanaka Hawaii. native Hawaiian**

Rather than letting the state define the boundaries of the kai, the kanaka Hawaii must establish the traditional boundaries beginning with kai uli, kai malolo (deep ocean to the summits) This is the fishermen's id of what part of the ocean they are in. According to practitioners, they recognize the farthest distance from the aina is the ho'oku'i.

Les – the terms kai uli kai ula. When I see the redness of the sky, Pele is calling me.

That is the ash of the volcano going to Nihoa. Ula and uli means red. Puu ulaula is Haleakala. (When the redness on the horizon comes before the rising of the sun).

Id the boundaries from practitioners. It's how the fishermen id's the distance and boundaries – it's what we want the government to accept, not their definition of boundaries. Those are the terms that we want to define our boundaries.

This crosses jurisdictions.

Les – in Kahoolawe, the eggs of the ahi are coming off of Niihau all the way from Nihoa. When you see the eggs on the currents, you know the currents.

NWHI feeds the main Hawaiian Islands.

Would like to cite the sections in the report. Specific information must be given on the islands and the ahupua'a. Islands must list how they identify the different sections of the shore, reef, and ocean.

Ilei: when I grew up, tutu taught me to get elima ina ula ula – and she will tell you exactly where to get it. Practices test you – you must be ready.

Papa knowledge – is generic from Maui to Niihau.

Boundary definitions must be described using Hawaiian terminology.

Sharon: The UH is used as the standard for Hawaiian terminology and practices. We must teach them our individual practices. Our way has value.

In support of our traditional knowledge, our literature is expansive. We can quote the Hawaiian literature, all in olelo Hawaii.

We've had a good discussion on the changes in the draft.

Kitty Simonds – as a director of a federal western we will accept the traditional knowledge as described by native Hawaiians. Whatever it is is what it is.

Vanda_ all of this is measurable.

Ilei – traditional knowledge on Nihoa. There are important wahi pana that affects Nihoa.

Lana`i Airport Meeting Room
September 18, 2008, 6:00 PM – 9:00 PM

Thanks to Auntie Winnie Basques for helping to set up the meeting. A number of issues and initiatives were discussed at the meeting. We discussed bottomfish, the Western Pacific Fishery Management Council process, the Aha Moku natural resource management system and organizing the community to participate in managing their natural resources. Winnie discussed Act 212 and the Aha Ki`ole Advisory Commission. We had some great participation from Gary Suzuki, George Purdy, Sid Alejado, the Kahananui's (Uncle Sam, Yasha Ann and Rechendra and the kids), Keith Aoki and Marcel Sagan.

One of the things that came out of the meeting was a discussion about Mo`omomi Bay on Moloka`i and how the community might be able to develop a similar program on Lana`i. The Lana`i community is interested in organizing their community to manage the resources at Maunalei village along Keomuku Highway along the lines of Mo`omomi. We want to continue this discussion but need some more information about what you folks are thinking. Were there two areas that were discussed at the meeting? Was it Keomuku village and Maunalei village? They are both abandoned habitation sites.

To that end, we will approach Uncle Mac Poepoe and Hui Malama O Mo`omomi to send representatives to Lana`i to share the Mo`omomi experience and consult with the community on how they can organize to manage these sites and `ahupua`a. This will require at least an overnight stay for the Mo`omomi presenters. We want to provide an opportunity for Mo`omomi to present information, site visits to the relevant sites and a consultation process, kukakuka, for the community to talk directly with the Mac and his crew. We would hope that this line of communication and network could be set up so the community can take control of and manage these cultural and natural resources.

We don't have email for Marcel Sagan, Sam Kahananui, Gary Suzuki and Keith Aoki, but they need to be included in this discussion. The more details we have from the community the better the chance for good outcomes from a Mo`omomi workshop.

Here's what we would like to know ahead of time:

1. Where are the sites the community is interested in?
2. What are the resources that you would like to manage?
3. Who are the most knowledgeable people about these sites and resources on Lana`i?
4. When is a good time for you so we can extend an invitation to Hui Malama O Mo`omomi? (We are looking at two days, in late October or November, maybe renting a house for those days, a place for workshops, planning, discussion and site visits).
5. If you are looking at managing and restoring a village site or a cultural site, we also know communities that are doing that.

The 'Aha Moku System will foster understanding and practical uses of knowledge, including native Hawaiian methodology and expertise, to assure responsible stewardship and awareness of the interconnectedness of the clouds, forest, valleys, land, streams, fishponds and seas.

The System will include the use of community expertise and establish programs and projects to improve communication, education, provide training on stewardship issues through out the region (moku), and increase education."

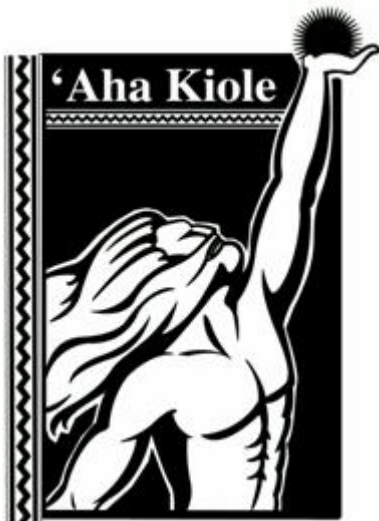

Re: Kona Hema Meeting to introduce to community organizations: ACT 212.

Kaleo Hookano opened up the discussion with an introduction from Roland Sagum, the district representative for the House of Representatives. Rep. Sagum explained his "kuleana" to the community groups and constituents in the audience. Approximately 20 people from separate organizations were in attendance. Groups in attendance were from: Dept. of Hawaiian Homes Lands, Kekaha Community Association, St. Theresa School Association, Waimea High and Intermediate School, and the "Guardian Angels," a drug-free non-profit organization located in the community as well as other independent comers.

The session began with a customary cultural protocol and "*kahea*" by Kumu Kaeo Bradford. Everyone participated and words of the chant were provided for viewing. The customary protocols for the *halawai* were reviewed, and then the meeting began.

The session was late in starting (approximately 5:42 p.m.), due to some initial technical difficulties with the computer and projector, however, the problem was remedied and the presentation (power-point) on Act 212 was underway. The presentation was interactive with the present 'Aha Kiole Community Coordinator-Leimana DeMate, *Mokupuni*-Island Representative-Sharon Pomroy, and *Moku* – District Representative-Kaleo Hookano, filling in details of the following:

1. History of the Mandate, Act 212
2. Puwalu gatherings (6)
3. Forming of the □Aha Kiole island groups across the state
4. Meetings to date across the islands
5. Issues and concerns
6. And the next step, forming of "*loea*" or practitioner's group.

Kumu Kaeo Bradford shared the importance of the circular cultural structure of "community-based" programs and adhering to the protocol as observed in the Hawaiian moon calendar.

A cultural break time was included to "feed" the necessary "*e ai ka ike*," (to eat knowledge) to give the audience time to digest the mental information. After the customary 'ai and social discussion, the customary "*kukakuka*," or discussion with audience participation took place. Everyone had a chance to speak his or her *mana'o* (feelings) on ACT 212.

Uncle Tommy Hashimoto shared his mana^o about his district of Halele^a and doing what they are currently doing. Juan Wilson from the Kona Akau district under Kiole Billy Ka^ohelauliⁱ, brought his maps of the South Shore area and shared what was taking place in the Poipu area. Retired Professor Jose Bulatao voiced his opinion on the need for all members of the community to work together in the effort to better serve the community while respecting the “host culture.”

Ken Taylor, a newcomer to the district that ran for a Kauai county council seat recently, brought up negative issues concerning the Hawaiian Sovereignty Movement. Native Hawaiians and a Native American in the audience felt that his comments were out of context and angrily voiced their opinions. S. Pomroy rose to the occasion and vehemently insisted that this meeting had nothing to do with any sovereignty groups or movements and that this was not the venue for that issue and that the focus was on the Governor’s Mandate and Act 212. The customary *ho oponopono* took place among the community members involved and the incident diminished.

The meeting continued and focused back on the main issues and; then proceeded to “*hoopau*” and end the meeting.

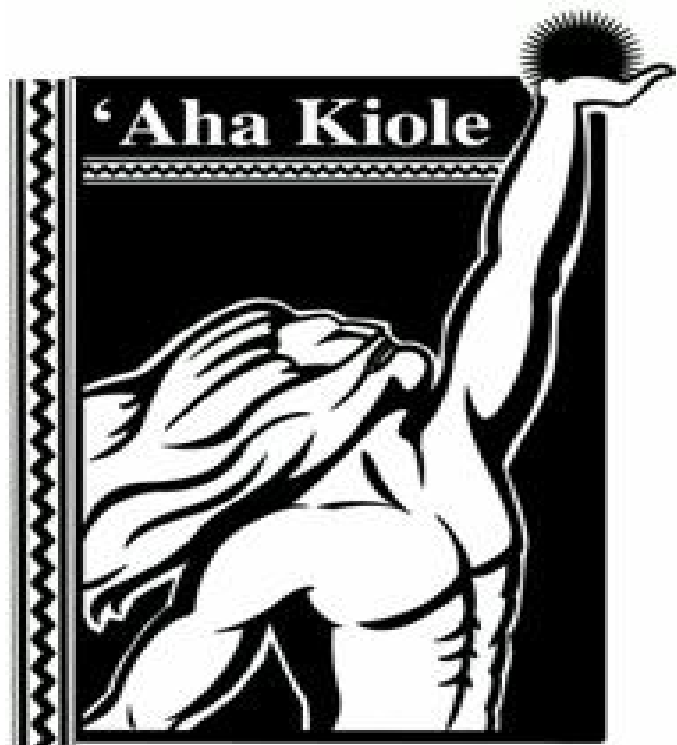

On behalf of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee (AKAC) we thank you for the opportunity to meet with the DLNR Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) on November 7, 2007. Focused on Act 212 and the process for the release of funding through DLNR the meeting was productive and we are very optimistic that everyone involved is doing all that they can to expedite this new process and the mandates that accompany it.

At this meeting, other issues were addressed that impact the AKAC but could not be addressed by DAR. It was recommended by DAR that we go directly to you for assistance in these requests for help.

The Aha Kiole Advisory Committee is the conduit through which the Aha Moku Councils and Ahupua'a communities will engage in resource management community consultation processes with agencies and others. As representatives of the Aha Moku System, the Aha Kiole and Aha Moku representatives need to periodically have access to office infrastructure. We do not anticipate this to be a daily occurrence, but on an as-needed basis with prior notification. As the Aha Moku System is really working with an ahupua'a concept which includes agriculture and forestry, we ask if the Division of Forestry and Wildlife (DOFAW), or the Division of Conservation and Resource Enforcement (DOCARE) would be willing to allow our representatives office space in their island offices.

It would be advantageous for all if the interaction between DAR, DOFAW, DOCARE and the Hawaiian community can be strengthened. We believe a good rapport with these divisions can assist in reaching a unified perspective in resource management.

We would like to ask that we meet with your DOFAW and DOCARE Division Heads to explore the possibility of utilizing some space in Honolulu and in your neighbor island offices.

I appreciate your patience as my Administration had deferred consideration of the release of grants-in-aid and specific appropriations until the current third quarter of the fiscal year. 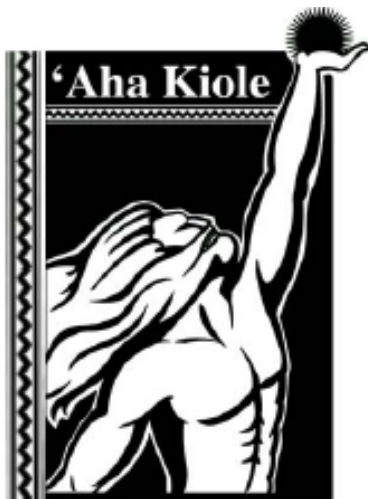

Aloha Noelani,

For thousands of years the environment and the unique ecosystem of the Hawaiian Islands were sustained in their pristine form by Native Hawaiians through a specific resource management method often referred to today as Ahupua'a Management Practices. However, over time and history, the western system of management took precedence over local practices resulting in great damage to the ecosystem, the natural resources and processes, and to the Native Hawaiian culture. It was clear that a drastic change in resource management was needed if the irreplaceable Hawaiian ecosystem was to be saved for future generations.

In 2006 and 2007 Native Hawaiian *lawai'a* (fishermen) and *mahiai* (farmers) expert kupuna and practitioners gathered at the Ho'ohanohano I Na Kupuna Puwalu Series. At these puwalu, the beginning of the Aha Moku System was created resulting in the passage of Act 212 in the 2007 Hawaii State Legislature. The Aha Kiole Advisory Committee (AKAC) was created in this Act.

The *'aha kiole* is comprised of eight leading Native Hawaiian *kupuna* and resource practitioners representing all of the main Hawaiian Islands. Its primary function is to advise the State government in the establishment of an *'Aha Moku* system that would revitalize traditional knowledge and empower Native Hawaiian communities in natural resource decision making by the State of Hawaii. We are committed to the principle that these communities are ultimately responsible for the productivity and health of their local resources but need to be able to act in a place-based, decentralized resource management system.


We have reviewed the work plan for the proposed Project *A'o Konohiki*, involving one year of planning and preparation to establish a future *konohiki* learning program. *Konohiki* is the term for an overseer of resource use on behalf of *ali'i*. Not all islands or districts of the main Hawaiian Islands came under *ali'i* rule. In these areas, the functions of the *konohiki* were performed by *'aha moku*.

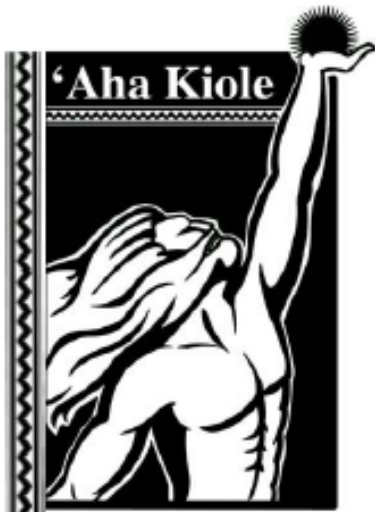
Revival of an 'Aha Moku system was discussed extensively at five gatherings (*Puwali*) during 2006-2007 attended by close to 200 Native Hawaiian *kupuna* and practitioners. These are the acknowledged expert practitioners from the 40 moku located in the State of Hawaii. Within this large group are certainly 15 people who would be well qualified to assist the proposed Project *A'o Konohiki* in defining culturally-appropriate criteria for the selection of candidates for a future *konohiki* or *konohiki*-like learning program (Objective 1). The *'aha kiole* are committed to recommending at least 15 of these *kupuna* and practitioners to participate in the proposed Project *A'o Konohiki*. This is highly compatible with our primary mission.

I would expect that our group might spend up to 16 hours in performing this activity.

Because the funding for Act 212 has not been released by Governor Lingle as of yet, all personal resources of the Kiole have been exhausted since the Act was enacted in July 2007.

The Kiole are scheduled to meet as a Committee of the Whole to plan Phase II of their timeline in carrying out the mandate of Act 212. Phase II entails scheduling community meetings to gathering public input and strategizing for the final Legislative Report due in December, 2008. Aloha Mr. Namuo,

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs has, from the beginning, been supportive of the goals of our traditional practitioners, lawai'a and mahiai, in integrating Native Hawaiian methodology into government regulatory policies. Their goals were achieved through the passage of Act 212, the Aha Moku System Act enacted in July 2007. The purpose of the Act is to begin the process of creating a moku system that will be beneficial to agencies as well as perpetuate the Hawaiian culture. However, Governor Lingle has not released the appropriated funds that were meant to fund the community meetings. The Kiolo have had to pay for all expenses personally and have found ways to get the message across by getting on the agenda of other organizations as well as holding numerous public community gatherings. Since Act 212 went into effect, sixty-eight (68) community meetings have been held by the Kiolo and moku representatives statewide to explain the Act and to garner support from the general public through Phase I of the strategic plan as described in the Interim Report to the Legislature.

From January 2008 until the present, the benchmarks and timelines prepared by the Kiolo to begin the process of aha moku management have been met. Now, Phase II – community meetings in which the actual process is explained must commence.

On behalf of the Aha Kiolo Advisory Committee, we ask OHA to kokua on our attempts to launch Phase II. Our Kiolo must meet to finalize the final report to the Legislature due in December 2008. This includes decision-making on what needs to go into the report at a full public community meeting scheduled for Friday, August 22, 2008 in Moloka'i. Our expenses are for air travel and lodging. Total amount needed is \$3,700. The breakdown is attached.

This meeting is needed as the Kiolo have only managed to meet once this year in January, at their own expense. Act 212 also fulfills OHA's Strategic Plan under Native Rights. 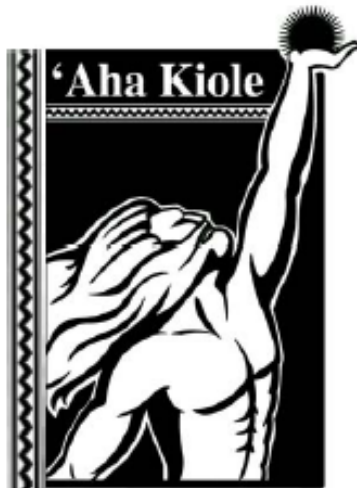

Phase 1 was held between January and July, 2008 and included holding numerous community meetings statewide to inform and educate Native Hawaiian beneficiaries and the general public on the merits of integrating Native Hawaiian traditional and generational resource methodology into existing government policies. Phase 2 was commenced on September 4, 2008 at the Chaminade University with an informational briefing for Native Hawaiian organizations. We are grateful that OHA and the AHCC were partners with us in that endeavor. Subsequent emails and follow-ups with the Hawaiian organizations that attended showed that the moku structures as compiled and refined by the moku kupuna, and input from the public was well received and supported.

Now, due to the timeline mandated by the Legislature, we are ready to embark on a strenuous and tight schedule of moku meetings to introduce the final moku structure for each island, have the communities select their moku spokespersons, and finalize the Aha Moku Structure. All of this information will be compiled into the Final Legislative Report on the Aha Moku System to be submitted in December, 2008.

As you are also aware, we are working with your Legislative Branch to amend Act 212 for the final report. The information needed for that report must be garnered at the Phase 2 public community meetings. The challenge we continue to face is that DLNR has not released any of the appropriated funds needed to complete these mandated meetings. Our moku representatives and Kiole are forging ahead with the meetings and will bear the expense, as they have for Phase 1 out of their personal funds. However, my presence and that of our Community Coordinator, Leimana DaMate is needed at these meetings. We are grateful that you recognized this, and agreed to kokua with funding the travel expenses for us. Without this support, these meetings will not show the unilateral support of all islands for this one system. And, as you are aware, it is important that the Chair and support staff be visible for consistency.

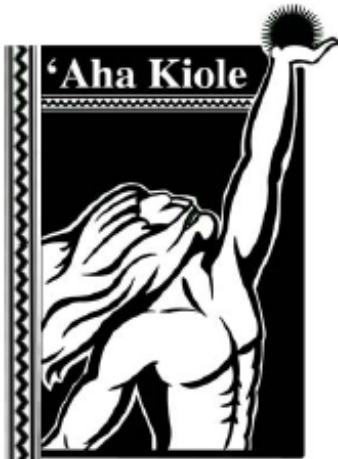

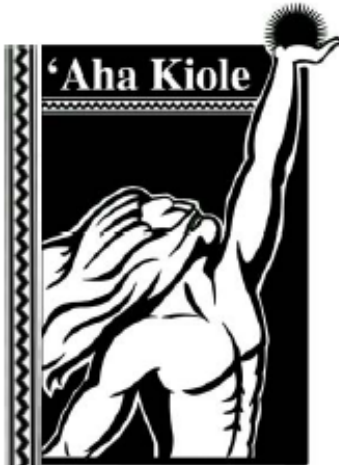
