A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LEGAL PERSONHOOD STATUS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Title 12, subtitle 6 of the Hawaii Revised
2	Statutes is amended by adding a new chapter to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"CHAPTER
5	PERSONHOOD STATUS FOR SIGNIFICANT INDIGENOUS SITES, GEOGRAPHICA
6	FEATURES, AND NATURAL RESOURCES
7	§ -1 Findings and declaration of necessity. The
8	legislature finds and declares that:
9	(1) The State of Hawaii is home to numerous physical
10	sites, geographical features, and natural resources
11	having historical, cultural, or religious significance
12	to native Hawaiians;
13	(2) Once identified, certain significant indigenous sites,
14	geographical features, and natural resources should be
15	granted special protection by securing legal
16	personhood status for these places and resources;

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1	(3)	Hawaii should look to the precedents set by other
2		jurisdictions, such as New Zealand, which granted
3		legal personhood status to the Whanganui River in 2017
4		based on the river's long history of providing
5		physical and spiritual support to indigenous tribes
6		associated with the river, and India, which granted
7		legal personhood status to the Ganges River in
8		recognition of its holy status and venerated place in
9		Indian mythology;
10	(4)	Granting legal personhood status to certain
11		significant indigenous sites, geographical features,
12		and natural resources means that these places and
13		resources have all the rights, powers, duties, and
14		liabilities of a legal person, and that any harm or
15		injury to these places and resources may be addressed
16		in the court system as if the harm or injury had been
17		inflicted upon a living human being; and
18	(5)	The larger aims of granting legal personhood status

8	§ -2 Securing of legal personhood status; determination;	
9	interagency cooperation. (a) The aha moku advisory committee	
10	shall be the lead state agency to coordinate efforts to	
11	determine which physical sites, geographical features, and	
12	natural resources having historical, cultural, or religious	
13	significance to native Hawaiians should be granted legal	
14	personhood status and the reasons therefor. After these places	
15	and natural resources have been identified, the aha moku	
16	advisory committee shall develop a process and timeline for	
17	initiating and completing the necessary legal proceedings to	
18	secure legal personhood status for these places and resources.	
19	(b) The aha moku advisory committee shall obtain the	
20	advice and assistance of the following government entities,	
21	which shall provide cooperation and collaboration:

14		geographical features, and natural resources having
15		historical, cultural, or religious significance to
16		native Hawaiians, pursuant to chapter ; and
17	(7)	Developing an administrative structure that oversees
18		the aha moku system."

Report Title:

Native Hawaiians; Indigenous Sites; Special Protection; Legal Personhood Status; DLNR; Aha Moku Advisory Committee

Description:

Establishes a means of determining which physical sites, geographical features, and natural resources having historical, cultural, or religious significance to native Hawaiians should be granted special protection by securing legal personhood status for these places and resources. Designates the aha moku advisory committee as the lead agency to coordinate this effort. Requires the department of land and natural resources to adopt rules no later than 12/31/2023.

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
